General comment

Housing shortage, is it a bubble?

What is happening with house prices in nz?

Why is money so cheap and plentiful yet inflation so low and property prices now seemingly out of reach for our next generation?

Rogernomics was a swift change in monetary policy during the 1980's which crippled our little country in the short term, but maybe we are now seeing the final outcome of that mantra.

We were promised by our govt that house prices would be corrected by the provision of much needed construction of more houses, but nothing has happened.

The RMA has limited the supply of land being made available to build on and so the land prices are experiencing very high inflation as a result.

To make matters worse, the population has grown exponentially since this pandemic started.

During the pandemic the govt in their wisdom made money even more easy to get by printing a tonne of it and removing any constraints for investors and home owners to borrow it in order to buy property.

I question why we need a CG tax to control house prices? IMO, we need the building and planning requirements altered to encourage affordable housing for first home buyers.

We need to provide a place for people to live, as thats a primary human need. That doesn't have to be a fancy 3 bedroom home built to withstand the worst earthquake or wind storm we have ever seen, nor does it need to look fancy either.

A start would be for council planners to to be forced to provide for and regulate subdivision of low productivity land near existing built up areas into intensive residential allotments. Also to provide for the further subdivision of lifestyle blocks near built up areas and for councils and developers to build cycleways into these rural areas to take pressure off the roading upgrade costs.

One of the constraints has been the inability of roading to cope with further growth and the lack of planning for growth within our public transport system.

Coupled with the climate change projections new regulations could replace the RMA providing a stimulus for exponential house/apartment building to meet forward demand.

There could be burdens put on property investors which prohibit dwellings to be unoccupied for prolonged periods of more than three months and banks could be regulated to ensure principle is repaid on loans.

Monetary policies could be tightened and restraints put on housing investors and in turn, the govt could provide for future generations by being the promoter of cheap basic housing.

New high intensity housing could all be solar equip, designed to collect and store water, be served by cycle ways and public transport. It could also be regulated to have light colours on house roofs and roads and be built from timber and other renewable resources which limit effects on climate change. Buildings could be smaller and energy efficient. The construction could be modular design, transportable and primarily built in factories through targeted govt loans.

Its a very easy situation to solve and could be rectified quickly if future home owners were aloud to construct their own basic affordable housing themselves.

Instead of the reserve bank printing all the money and giving it to banks for investors to suck up,

give govt loans to first home buyers to buy cheaper land provided for by local and regional authorities enacting much needed changes.

As for climate change, start govt projects building national cycle routes on good grades and invest in public transport with electric busses feeding from all suburbs and all built up rural areas. Incentivise public transport and electric bikes/motorbikes through the use of road tolls, speed limits and regulation (for example limit use of roads by cars with one occupant by requiring a permit). Use dedicated driving lanes for multi person vehicles, give govt subsidies for electric bikes/motorbikes. Allow for buildings to be built up higher in existing built up areas near business hubs.

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Long Term Plan Brief to Local Government

Summary

Council will shortly be consulting on the draft Long-Term Plan. Addressing the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic on your local community, both socially and economically, will no doubt be a major focus.

The purpose of this brief is to communicate Toi Te Ora Public Health's recommended priorities and opportunities for community health and wellbeing in light of the COVID-19 pandemic.

This brief is in place of a formal written submission from Toi Te Ora Public Health (Toi Te Ora).

The COVID-19 pandemic is having a significant impact on community and organisational priorities. Substantial community needs have arisen at the same time as significant resource constraints. Working together to prioritise resilience and equity in our decisions and actions will help us recover successfully from the consequences of COVID-19 as the pandemic unfolds.

Brief Situation Analysis

Impacts on the community

Soon after Alert Level 4 lockdown controls were lifted, Toi Te Ora undertook a *Community Health and Wellbeing Needs Assessment* to investigate the impacts and consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic on the Lakes and Bay of Plenty community. The assessment confirmed population groups that were already disadvantaged suffered the most as a result of COVID-19. These groups include Māori, Pasifika, women, young people and older people. Housing issues, food insecurity, unemployment and income instability, and mental health challenges contributed to the hardship experienced by these groups¹.

Key points

- COVID -19 has already had major social and economic consequences for communities.
- Some groups have been particularly affected, including Māori, Pasifika, women, young people and older people.
- Toi Te Ora recommends focusing on building resilience and achieving equity to maximise health and wellbeing.
- Resilience and equity pathways include employment, housing, food security, mental wellbeing and environmental health protection.



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Impact on our respective organisations

We recognise the COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on local government, including tightening finances. Many councils have resourced COVID-19 response and recovery plans to meet specific and immediate needs of their communities, and this will feature in council Long Term Plans.

Likewise, Toi Te Ora has had to pivot away from many of our business-as-usual services and concentrate on managing the ongoing risk from COVID-19 cases arriving at the border, community transmission or other significant adverse events. We have reduced our engagement in non-Covid-19 policy making processes, this includes council submissions.

The opportunity of an All-of-Government approach

All social, environmental and economic issues, including those generated by COVID-19, have complex causes requiring multidimensional solutions. These issues cannot be tackled in isolation by a single agency. Our collective response to COVID-19 is an example of the value of an All-of-Government approach.

The Government's proposed Public Sector Reforms present an opportunity to ensure a more joined-up and people focused public service. The Wairariki Bay of Plenty Regional Leadership Group has a mandate to provide coherence, connection and collaboration to deliver best outcomes at a local level for whanau and communities. This group could enhance Council recovery initiatives, particularly in times of resource constraints.

Strategic Recommendations

Focus on building community resilience

COVID-19 has been an exceptional shock for the local community both socially and economically. It is essential to focus on building community resilience as we all traverse this pandemic and prepare for future adverse events. Whilst many events cannot be prevented, how much we all suffer, how much we all prosper, and whether the consequences are experienced fairly, relate to the efforts we collectively put into building resilience in the community.

Defining Community Resilience

Community resilience is the process by which communities are strengthened and supported to withstand the impact of adversity. To be resilient, communities need healthy and safe environments, connectedness, fairness and equity, trusted organisations, flexibility and self-belief (Toi Te Ora, 2019).



Make equity central to decision-making and service delivery, especially equity for Māori.

Achieving equity is an essential pathway to building community resilience. People with fewer means, resources and protection are less able to withstand the consequences of adverse experiences. Therefore, ensuring a fair distribution of power and access to resources is essential to resilience. In the context of COVID-19 recovery, it is important that those groups who are most affected by COVID-19 have more focus from councils and other government agencies.

Resilience and equity for Māori

Māori suffer the worst and most enduring inequitable health outcomes in New Zealand, stemming from our colonial history and the resulting issues of racism, privilege and unequal power distribution. To build Māori resilience and promote equity for Māori, government agencies such as DHBs and councils must significantly improve the way we work with Māori. Supporting and building on iwi-led responses to COVID-19 is one such opportunity.

Defining Equity

In Aotearoa New Zealand, people have differences in health that are not only avoidable but unfair and unjust. Equity recognises different people with different levels of advantage require different approaches and resources to get equitable health outcomes (Ministry of Health, 2019).

Pathways to Delivering the Recommendations

Employment

Income instability due to the economic impacts of COVID-19 is increasing inequity. Young people, women, Māori and Pasifika are disproportionately affected by unemployment and income instability as they are more likely to work in fixed-term, part-time and low-income jobs.

Three quarters of young Māori work in sectors affected by job losses

Additionally, these groups are more likely to work in industries affected by COVID-19. Three quarters of young Māori work in sectors affected by job lossesⁱⁱ. To reduce economic disparities, barriers to employment and to build greater community resilience, Toi Te Ora supports the following:

- Greater efforts to improve access to employment for young people, women, Māori and Pasifika; and
- Recovery planning which considers those most affected by economic instability. Councils should create opportunities to employ people most affected by the economic impacts of COVID-19.



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Bay of Plenty + Lakes Districts



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Housing

Housing needs to be healthy, affordable and suitable for people's needs. By July 2020 the average weekly house rental in the Bay of Plenty was \$470, an increase of fifteen percent since January 2019. Combined with employment and underlying financial stresses this increase results in housing being unaffordable for many which leads to a growing reliance on unhealthy housing alternatives.

4,200 emergency housing grants paid which totalled to \$8 million

The lack of suitable rental housing in our region meant there were 4,200 emergency housing grants paid totalling \$8 million in the quarter ending 31 March 2020^{iii, iv}. Housing is a key determinant of health and it is an important mediating factor in reducing health inequalities and poverty. To achieve accessible, affordable and suitable healthy housing Toi Te Ora supports the following:

- Councils to address unhealthy and unaffordable housing across the spectrum from emergency housing through to home ownership. An example of this is the recent implementation of the Rotorua Lakes Council's 'He Papakāinga, He Hāpori Taurikura - Homes and Thriving Communities Strategic Framework'; and
- Councils to ensure compliance with the Healthy Homes Standards and Housing Improvement Regulations.

Food security

COVID-19 has seen a marked reduction in food security, indicated by increased demand for food parcels both during and after lockdown^v. Food insecurity is defined as a limited or uncertain availability of nutritionally adequate and safe foods (including water), or limited ability to acquire personally acceptable foods that meet cultural needs in a socially acceptable way.

Increased demand for food parcels both during and after lockdown

In New Zealand food insecurity is largely due to a lack of sufficient money for food, although other socio-cultural factors also play a role^{vi}. Neighbourhoods with higher levels of deprivation are therefore less likely to be food secure, as are Māori and Pacific households. Addressing food insecurity requires a systemic approach involving cross-sectoral collaboration between local government, iwi, education, food growers, manufacturers, distributors, sellers, and the community^{vii}. To improve food security, especially for Māori and Pacific communities, Toi Te Ora recommends Councils undertake the following actions:

- Community engagement with food insecure groups;
- Development of a community food security strategy to identify and coordinate action;
- Support and strengthen existing community food networks aimed at promoting healthy food systems;



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- Support existing initiatives that promote community food resilience and support local food economies;
- Ensure availability of adequate and safe food and water at all times; and
- Contribute to efforts to raise incomes among food insecure groups and reducing the cost of living associated with major household expenses such as housing and transport.

Mental health

COVID-19 has adversely impacted the mental health and wellbeing of many people associated with uncertainty and hardship. Following lockdown the demand for specialist mental health services across the Bay of Plenty exceeded capacity. Numbers of unclosed cases increased more than five-fold over the previous 12 months¹. Uncertainty and hardship will continue to have a detrimental impact on mental health and community resilience. To reduce and prevent detrimental mental health in our community, Toi Te Ora supports the following:

500-900% increase in mental health referrals that were considered unclosed cases compared to the previous year

- Promote a sense of purpose and value through community connection and participation. This can be achieved by increasing access to community services such as pools, libraries, parks, and quality amenities that welcome all ethnicities, abilities and identities, and providing free community events for different audiences;
- Improve public and active transport systems that enable the most disadvantaged to access education, employment, health services, spiritual places and recreation;
- Reduce harm caused by alcohol by implementing effective regulations, within Local Alcohol Policies, such as single sales and operating hours;
- Reduce harm caused by tobacco smoking and vaping by increasing smokefree and vape-free public spaces;
- Reduce harm caused by gambling through the implementation of sinking lid policies;
- Encourage and support employment pathways for the most disadvantaged;
- Promote messages and campaigns that support mental health and wellbeing; and
- Support environmental projects and enable community connection with the natural environment.

¹ Unclosed cases are patients who have not received treatment or been discharged from care.



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Environmental health protection

Environmental health is a component of public health protection, and includes the physical, chemical, and biological aspects of the natural and built environment that affect human health. Preventing harm is underpinned by the quality of the air, water, soil, biodiversity, land productivity, and the built environment. Healthy environment principles promote community resilience, good nutrition, physical activity and quality of life.

To prevent harm by avoiding and reducing risks to health from the natural and built environment, Toi Te Ora supports the following:

- Enhance and extend the delivery of core public health services such as the three waters, regulatory services, and municipal and hazardous waste management throughout all communities with Māori networked supplies being the priority, not just council owned supplies;
- Enable and promote community infection prevention and control measures such as access to toilet and hand hygiene conveniences and staying home when unwell;
- Continually improve the quality of discharges to the environment including mitigating greenhouse gas emissions, increasing the use of public transport, greater use of renewable energy, waste minimisation and energy efficiency improvement;
- Action to mitigate, respond to and manage the effects of climate change on the community;
- A long-term planning focus that reduces the need for quick fixes;
- Rural and urban community-built environments are designed to be healthy and promote Toi Ora (flourishing health and wellbeing for all); and
- Business continuity preparedness that enables Council to continue to provide essential services throughout long term adverse events and emergencies

It is estimated that around 800,000 New Zealanders receive their drinking water from supplies that are not regulated (Taumata Arowai, 2020)

Public Toilets & Cemeteries

Good Afternoon David, Gareth,

I am writing to you about the lack of toilet facilities for Heavy Transport Driver / Operators in the Taupo Region, especially after what you would call normal working hours, and for those units that are unable to come into the centre of the Taupo township due to the restrictions of their High Productivity Motor Vehicle (HPMV) permits which do not allow them to divert off of main roads.

We are seeing an increase in behaviour that is unsanitary and this is certainly not what the Transport Industry wants to portray, but because of the lack of facilities in the region and the recent closure of a toilet at a local *Z Energy Truckstop in Miro Street, this behaviour is becoming more common unfortunately. We have been fielding a lot of calls from our Members complaining about the lack of a decent facility in the region, especially those that have a high number of women drivers working for them, as you will appreciate the needs of a women driver are somewhat different to that of a man, and this is becoming a real issue for those female drivers.

*I am aware that the toilet at the Z Energy Truckstop in Miro Street was funded and arranged by the land owner, but he shut the toilet after a complaint from the council? I would like to know more about this complaint if I could? In speaking with a representative from Z Energy, I believe they are happy to fund the existence of the toilet on this site but would like the local council to pay for the cleaning of it, this could be something that could be explored further if you wish?

However we are still in a desperate need to have something built on the main highway, or just off of it, that would help those drivers that need to stop in this area, so I would be happy to meet with either of you, or a chosen representative of the Taupo District Council, to see what may be able to be done in this regard.

LTP Submission – Kinloch Golf Club
Acquisition of Kubota Tractor & Trimax Snake S2 Mower

The Taupo District Council has recently spent millions of dollars with the implementation and installation of a treated effluent irrigation scheme at the Kinloch Golf Club. The benefits are numerous for both parties, mainly; safe dispersal of treated effluent along with enhancing the playing environment at the course.

It has also brought with it new issues for the Golf Club.

1. The Clubs existing machinery is now inadequate for the mowing upkeep of the fairways at the new rate of grass growth.
2. 3 times the mowing required to maintain normal playing conditions.
3. Extra expenses for the Club; machinery maintenance and labour.
4. Voluntary machinery maintenance now too much to ask, paid repairs/maintenance now a necessity.
5. A higher number of visitors playing the course, requiring more attention for daily upkeep of greens and tees.

The Kinloch Golf Club is putting this submission forward for the acquisition of fairway mowing equipment;

a) A Kubota L5740 Base Tractor with turf wheels	\$46,049.92
b) TD170-981714 DA FD remote with Lever Kit	\$901.38
c) A Trimax Snake S2 320 mower	<u>\$34,789.00</u>
	\$81,740.30

This is the mowing arrangement currently in use at The Taupo Golf Club.

From Andrew Ellis – Greenkeeper Kinloch Village Golf Club

“We have been mowing the fairways with the Z turn rotary mower at about 25 mms which is quite a slow process.

The irrigation got turned on about mid December after about 3 weeks we could clearly see the green lines and now after 8 weeks we are blown away with the amount of extra grass we have on the fairways which is good for golf but requires a lot of mowing.

We are currently mowing the fairways every week, where we would normally stop mowing in January right through the summer period with just a couple of mows in the autumn. The plan is to start mowing them with the Jacobsen 3800 shortly and drop the height down a little.

My concern is with all the extra mowing and labour costs and with the Jacobsen having done well over 5000 hours that it is going to be a lot of extra expense on the Golf Club to mow all the extra grass not only with the labour costs but also the machinery maintenance of the older gear. Most of the maintenance of our machines is done voluntary.

The Club is already in the process of purchasing a late model Toro Greens mower”

The photos below clearly show the definition along the irrigated areas in stark contrast to the usual summer conditions. More drone photos and video footage is available on request.

Clearly visible are the usual fairway conditions for this time of year seen as brown strips under the trees.

In picture on the left the drying out of the fairways is evident (February 2020)

In the picture on the right hand side the fairways are green and the dry strips under the trees are obvious (February 2021)

Usual summer golf will have all fairways in this very brown, dry, hard state.

The Kinloch Golf Club has worked closely with the Taupo District Council during the irrigation installation process, and there was a period where some of the course was unplayable with fairways and areas close to some greens being dug up.

The Club were impacted financially, with Covid 19 restrictions and with a drop in green fee players the Club showed a financial loss for the first time in our recent history.

However, remedial works undertaken and kind rainfall late spring has seen a remarkable recovery over the entire golf course.

Despite the green areas now in abundance regular fairway maintenance like de-compacting and coring is now not an option due to the shallow pipe depth along the fairway system.

We wish to continue our close partnership with the Taupo District Council, and ask our neighbours there to play their part in helping remedy the new problems we face with all this extra grass and expenses relating to its management.

The Club has already initiated an increase in Green fees and annual membership subscriptions of 10% across all playing groups to assist with the loss shown in our accounts, however any gains made here will likely be absorbed by incremental increases of other course associated costs.

We are also on a fundraising drive for the purchase of late model Toro greens mower. The purchase of the greens mower is a priority as the current machine is high in hours and in need of replacement, the Club is already committed its available funds to its purchase this asset this financial year.

With the evolving situation on the fairways due to our new irrigation system, we are now faced with unforeseen expenses unbudgeted for going forward, hence this submission application.

We envisage that the equipment this submission is requesting will last the Club 20 years, and will be the most efficient solution for all concerned. Most importantly our labour expense as we are proud to say we have the best Green Keeper in New Zealand taking care of this very special shared green space in the heart of the beautiful Kinloch Village.

Our Course Superintendent Andrew Ellis is a well known and highly respected in New Zealand greenkeeping circles, he is writing an article about the fairway irrigation installation and its impact on the Kinloch Golf Course as many other Clubs are interested in the outcome.

We believe the interest shown in this project and the benefits for other golf clubs as well as the initiative shown by the Taupo District Council will show other Local Authorities how progressive thinking and the ensuing positive outcomes these sorts of community partnerships allow.

As the Taupo population grows it is important that reserves and parks are available and accessible for all. There needs to be provision for all users - walkers, runners, cyclists and dog owners. With the increasing number of cyclists using the Lake Taupo pathway and the loss of the Five Mile Bay reserve area for dog exercise in the past year there is more pressure on walking and other off-leash areas. The gullies which are being cleared and revegetated are ideal dog exercise areas. It is important to ensure these open spaces are retained for such activity.

There is huge community commitment to enhancing these neighbourhood areas so Council has an important role in facilitating and honouring neighbours' wishes.

Also, ensure the encroachment of developers onto Lake Taupo pathway is overseen e.g. at the end of Chad Street. Council has assured me that the developer will return the pathway to better than when he went in there late 2019. There seems to be at least another 12 months of work before the buildings are completed. Council must ensure the developer gets the pathway restored before he leaves the site.

Lastly, please fix the retaining wall adjacent to the Kowhai Street pumping station. It is a messy disgrace and I've asked several times for work to be done to tidy it up.

As the sole facilitator of netball within the Taupo District and with what is likely the largest memberships of team sports within Taupo, we would like to have the following areas of improvement supported by TDC.

Courts - Some of our courts are in need of repair and resurfacing, most are in need of having lines repainted.

Lights - We currently only have two of the ten courts with lights, which are old and of poor quality and not suitable for playing games. We are in need of having these upgraded and an extra two courts with lights, which will give us four courts with good lighting, for trainings and games.

Carparks - We would like to have the small carpark behind our pavilion upgraded with either metal or sealed. We would also like TDC to consider increasing the size of the large carpark to take up some of the currently unused grass area inbetween netball and the velodrome.

Trees - We have ongoing issues with the oak trees planted around our courts, as they lose their

leaves and create a real safety hazard on our courts, as they become wet and slippery. Ideally replacing these trees with evergreens would make our facilities safer.

COMPETITIONS & PROGRAMMES

- ❖ **MIXED INDOOR NETBALL** – 24 Mens & Womens mixed teams compete in 3 grades for 12 weeks throughout the year
- ❖ **ANZ FUTURE FERNS** – Students that are Year 1 – 8 complete the 8 – 12 week new Netball New Zealand junior programme. Y1 & Y2 are on Tuesdays and the others are on Saturday mornings.
- ❖ **SENIOR COMPETITION** – All College School teams and Senior women's teams compete in a 16 week Saturday afternoon competition
- ❖ **REPRESENTATIVE TEAMS** – Taupo Netball Centre has Under 16 and Under 18 teams who compete in nationally held representative tournaments. Our teams achieve highly at these tournaments, especially given we are deemed a small centre within our region and nationally.

COURTS

Our Centre has 10 full courts and one half warm up court, with the assistance of Taupo District Council we work towards ensuring our courts are of good quality for our competitions and tournaments

PAVILION

TNC fully funds all maintenance and upgrades to the pavilion. We are constantly striving to provide a good quality facility for our members and the local community.

With the aid of funding grants from Trusts, 2012 pavilion renovations and extensions were started, creating a two story extension for an umpire/committee room, storage for equipment and representative equipment and uniforms, a disability toilet and a new female toilet block, alongside bringing the building up to the latest building code with the latest emergency doors, lighting and alarms. Final stages including a new deck were completed in 2014 and new indoor training flooring in 2015.

COURTS

Most of our courts are of a poor to average quality, with them needing maintenance and resurfacing within the next 2 years.

Four courts were resurfaced within the last LTP however have been unsatisfactory and showed immediate issues and have been deemed a slippery surface. These same courts have also been damaged by TDC staff when in 2019 they chose to waterblast them (despite us actually asking for different courts to be cleaned but they chose to different courts due to finals, with no consultation to us so the actual unsafe courts remain uncleaned), the water blasting has removed some of the surface of the courts.

The other courts are of an asphalt surface and need maintenance or resurfacing.

Photos are of the courts in their current condition, as of March 2021.

Given we facilitate the only netball competitions within our District (note Turangi/Kuratau do not have competitions and on average only have 1 senior team and approximately 4 school teams annually, so they play in the Taupo competition), it is imperative that our facilities are able to provide rate payers with a quality sports venue.

We have photos on the following pages showing the disrepair of the courts, these were taken on 31st March 2021 and are not duplicate issues, each one is of a different surface issue. There are many more issues but we did not have room for all photos.

LIGHTS

We currently only have two of the ten courts with lights, which severely limits how many teams can train at the courts and we are unable to play games under these lights.

The current lights are very old and of poor quality.

We would have a great need to add two courts with lights to give us a total of four courts with lights, and upgrade the old lights, this would ensure we can train and play without having to use other facilities (many teams have to hire indoor facilities as we do not have enough courts for evening trainings).

CARPARKS

Due to the very high numbers of members attending our competitions and facilities, we struggle to provide car parking spaces and then we have cars parked unsafely.

We would like to have the small carpark behind our pavilion upgraded with either metal or sealed. This is the emergency entrance to and from the courts, where we unfortunately require regular ambulance access. This is also the area where TDC access the facilities.

We would like TDC to consider increasing the size of the large carpark to take up some of the currently unused grass area in between netball and the velodrome. This space is rarely used and when it is it is often for large event carparking anyway.

TREES

We have ongoing issues with the oak trees planted around our courts, as they lose their leaves and create a real safety hazard on our courts, as they become wet and slippery. This has been an ongoing issue for many years and despite us requesting removal of the trees in the immediate vicinity of the courts, we have been told they were 'gifts' to Taupo. We do not believe 'gifts' should come before the safety of our members.

We also have concerns on the cost to ratepayers to maintain these trees, as TDC staff spend hours clearing and picking the leaves when they can, this must run at a cost that could be better spent on our venues.

We would like TDC to consider replacing these trees with evergreens as they would make our facilities safer.

1. **SUBMISSION:**
2. **Request to apply for funds through the 'Long Term Plan process'.**
3. The business case for the Mōtutere Point Trust wastewater connection is attached; prepared by Michael Cordell Wastewater Asset Manager TDC which we worked in discussions and planning together for a few years.
4. The connection of Mōtutere Point Papakāinga is not currently included in the draft plan and we missed out in the previous plan. This process is our only and last alternative.
5. The Trust firmly believe both options, connection to WWTP (**TDC**) at Mōtutere Recreation Reserve or stand-alone plant should be considered.
6. We should be a high-priority not an after thought as we have been through for many years.
7. It affects Ngāti Tuwharetoa o hapu relationship with TDC when our rights are not honored.
8. Brent Fletcher of WRC about the Wastewater treatment plant on our land does appear to be a possibility also.
9. We have been rate payers since it was legislated for Māori land owners by outside intrusion if we didn't agree the land would have been confiscated like many others.
10. We agreed to support Waikato Regional Council (**WRC**) to renew the Waste Management Plant and upgrade at Mōtutere Recreation Reserve (**MRR**) for the camping ground lease in accordance with the 'Treaty of Waitangi principles' as they needed hapu approval first .We agreed on the condition we get connected at Motutere Point Papakainga for all the whānau who have been waiting for many years. Mr Tilton lessee at the camping ground is happy he has his renewal to service his camping ground customers meanwhile we have been let down.

11. The trustees at the Mōtutere Point Papakāinga are under financial stress servicing the very old septic tanks frequently @ \$500 each time of 14 homes and we can't allow other owners to occupy the five empty sections to build homes.
12. All we get for paying rates is rubbish and recycling collections. Waitapu Road and State Highway have no decent footpath for residences etc it has been neglected by TDC. The walkways at the point under TDC ownership should be returned to us as they have never been maintained and of no benefit to TDC.
13. TDC preference is supporting new housing and commercial developments and other plans around Taupo District from our rates payments.

14. Background:

15. Ōpawa Rangitoto 2F land block was partitioned in the 1930s from the Ōpawa Rangitoto 1 land block before it was confiscated by the Crown under PWA and is currently known as the Mōtutere Recreation Reserve (**MRR**).
16. Ngāti Te Rangiita hapu o Ngāti Tuwharetoa iwi have Māna Whenua to these blocks and wider surrounding land in the rohe (district).
17. Mōtutere Papakāinga is a very sacred and a special place of significant environmental, spiritual, wāhi tapu, of historical value and 100 years of history it was previously an exclusive site of occupation including Pa, abundance mara kai, bordering our sacred lake of fishing and collecting koura a hunting ground in other wider landscape. It is an access point for waka journey to Mōtutaiko Mōtu (**Island**) Wāhi Tapu for a resting place of our treasured Arikini (Chiefs) and Tupuna for protection from outside intrusion. This sacred whēnua belongs to us and we belong to the whēnua. Two pa sites was at Mōtutere, one named Mōtutere and the other named Poutū.
18. Mōtutere Papakāinga is one of very few lake front properties that was not confiscated through the colonial era from the 1800s to date under the Public works act (**PWA**) and other created legislation in their hunger for Māori land because of our strong connection to Mōtutaiko Mōtu (**island**) Wāhi Tapū.
19. **Te Āo Māori-Papakāinga.**
A Papakāinga is the ancestral whenua of a Maori kinship group and collective form of Māori living. Residents are connected to each other and the land, by a common whakapapa. Papakāinga draw on the greater economic independence and the expression of social and cultural values of Kāupapa Māori. The kāinga are more than physical structures. It's for whānau to strengthen connections between generations, reinforce cultural and spiritual identities and revitalize Te Rēo Māori. Protection of our turangawaewae is essential for the well-being of our tamariki, whanau and nga uru whakatipu (future generations).

20. The created legislative act to enforce Māori land owners to pay survey and rates fees were one mechanism of many to confiscate our land. This force a decision in the 1950s by Arikini ta Hepi te Heuheu and iwi leaders as trustees to lease out Mōtutere block to non-owners to cover rate payments. However Māori land owners were not permitted to charge market rates and peppercorn leases was to cover rates only without a profit. In 1989 legislation was amended so Māori land owners can equally charged market rates the same as land owners under general title to date. When Lessees were notified they will be paying market rates by a specific date this instigated multiple high court proceedings as a result the judgement ruled in the Trust favor. They were offered to surrender their lease agreement without penalty instead of liability to pay market rental which they disapproved.
21. The leases were from 1954/55 for a term of 42 years with a right of renewal for 18 sections. When the Trust eventually relinquish the leases they offered the homes to the beneficial land owners for reasonable rent to cover,rates,maintenance and insurance.
22. The Mōtutere Point Trustees, Ngāti Te Rangiita hapu and Ngāti Tuwharetoa Māori Trust Board would appreciate your serious consideration to do what is right for our people.

Water

I think that Council should move towards metering water, on the basis that it is wealthier people (like me) who use more water and who can best afford to pay. There could be a "free" allocation to each individual or household with usage above that being charged for. This may reduce water use, and I understand that it typically does, although there will always be some who use as much as they wish no matter what the cost.

Council needs to strongly resist the continual pressure from some (vocal) rate payers to reduce spending on infrastructure - in the broadest sense. (See library and museum, below). Not investing appropriate resources into maintaining and improving physical infrastructure is very short-sighted, as we are seeing in specific cases around New Zealand now. Similar issues seem to be being faced world-wide.

Transport

I generally agree with Council's plan for traffic around the town centre.

Although I have never used the local bus service, I believe that it should be continued.

Parks, Reserves & Sports Grounds

I think that Council does an excellent job of providing and maintaining our green spaces and associated facilities. Some of this probably has economic benefit - either indirectly by making the Taupo District an attractive place to visit, or by providing specific tourist attractions, such as Otumuheke. However, the main benefit is to the life style we enjoy, and to children particularly, in terms of sports ground and play grounds.

Libraries & Museum

Libraries and museums are public goods: they provide value to all sorts of people in the community, so should be funded by the public. That is, through Council rates (or possibly Central Government taxes). There will always be people who begrudge paying for something that they do not use directly, even though that may have had the advantage of it, in their school days, for example.

They are part of our culture and so are part of each of us, whether we use them frequently or not.

Swimming Pools

I used to use the AC baths very frequently but seldom do now. However, I believe that Council has the mix right here.

Wastewater

See comment on Water: Council needs to strongly resist the continual pressure from some (vocal) rate payers to reduce spending on infrastructure - in the broadest sense. The provision of fresh water and environmentally low impact disposal of wastewater is an essential part of a healthy society. It is also an obligation of "wealthy" societies like ours and is not difficult and not particularly costly.

See previous comments on infrastructure. I think that the current system of handling solid waste is about right. I am thinking particularly about the Broadlands Road site as that is the only one that I use.

I do not know if it would be beneficial to increase the cost differential between general waste and other partly recyclables such as green waste and concrete to encourage people to separate waste streams. There could also be more education - about the need to minimise and the options, but then there is quite a proportion who are probably uneducable.

Stormwater

See previous comments on infrastructure. It is one of those things that the general public does not notice - until something goes wrong. (And then it is always someone else's fault - not lack of investment by ratepayers).

Economic Development & Events

I agree with Council backing some large events, which undoubtedly bring some economic benefit to the community with generally little negative impact apart from a little inconvenience.

Financial Strategy & Infrastructure Strategy

See comments on infrastructure above. Council must not shy away from investing appropriate amounts in physical infrastructure particularly but social infrastructure too. (I am continually intrigued/annoyed by the line that those on "fixed incomes" cannot cope with rate rises. How do they cope with continuous rises in fuel, food, rent and virtually everything else?).

Rates

As above, Council must not shy away from investing appropriate amounts in physical infrastructure particularly but social infrastructure too.

My wife and I own a few rental properties so pay rates on those as well as our home and are very happy to do so. I appreciate that things that we need (and want sometimes) need to be paid for and the current rating system seems to share that reasonably well.

Feedback to Long Term Annual Plan 2021

Dear Mayor and councillors,

We understand that the Government is set to move decision making solely to the Director General of Health. However, councillors are elected and paid to represent and protect the community. Considering the growing research being carried out in fluoridated countries showing harm to health, and the increased pressures on council finances, we propose that Council take a serious interest in the health of the community and stop fluoridation.

Here are short summaries of just a few of the studies on neurotoxicity:

2006: The National Research Council published *Fluoride in Drinking Water*,¹ the most authoritative review of fluoride's toxicity. It stated unequivocally that "fluorides have the ability to interfere with the functions of the brain and the body."

2012: A Harvard-funded meta-analysis² found that children ingesting higher levels of fluoride tested an average 7 IQ points lower in 26 out of 27 studies. Most had higher fluoride concentrations than in U.S. water, but many had total exposures to fluoride no more than what millions of Americans receive. The same is true of New Zealand exposures. In fact the US level is now a maximum of 0.7ppm, whereas Hutt City levels are 0.85ppm.

2017: A National Institutes of Health (NIH) – funded study³ in Mexico covering 13 years found that every one half milligram per liter (mg/L) increase in fluoride in pregnant women's urine – approximately the difference caused by ingestion of fluoridated water⁴ – was associated with a reduction of their children's IQ by about 3 points. Leonardo Trasande, a leading physician unaffiliated with the study, said it "raises serious concerns about fluoride supplementation in water."⁵

2018: A Canadian study⁶ found iodine-deficient adults (nearly 18% of the population) with higher fluoride levels had a greater risk of hypothyroidism (known to be linked to lower IQs). Author Ashley Malin said "I have grave concerns about the health effects of fluoride exposure."⁷

2019: Another NIH-funded study⁸ published in *Journal of the American Medical Association Pediatrics* found every 1 mg/L increase in fluoride in Canadian pregnant women's urine was linked to a 4.5 decrease in IQ in their male children. The physician editor of *JAMA Pediatrics* said "I would not have my wife drink fluoridated water"⁹ if she was pregnant.

2019: A Canadian study¹⁰ found a nearly 300% higher risk of ADHD for children living in fluoridated areas. This reinforced earlier study linking fluoride to ADHD in Mexico (2018)¹¹ and the U.S. (2015).¹²

2019: A systematic review of 149 human studies and 339 animal studies by the U.S. National Toxicology Program¹³ concluded that “fluoride is presumed to be a cognitive neurodevelopmental hazard to humans.” The report is still in draft form, but NTP has also said there is little chance they will change their finding.

2020: Another NIH-funded study¹⁴ in Canada found that for babies fed formula mixed with fluoridated water, every additional 0.5 mg/litre fluoride reduced their IQ by 4.4 points. In NZ, where we typically fluoridate at 0.85 ppm and natural levels are very low, this represents a 7 IQ point loss (Half a Standard Deviation, which is significant).. Losses of non-verbal IQ were even more serious, an average of 9 points.

We would like to speak to our submission if possible.

REQUEST FOR FUNDING SUPPORT FOR NEW ZEALAND MEMORIAL MUSEUM & VISITOR CENTRE, LE QUESNOY, FRANCE

Background

In the closing days of the First World War, our soldiers on the Western Front, exhausted survivors of battles on the Somme, Messines, Passchendaele and from halting the 1918 Spring Offensive, had one last wall to climb – literally.

The small town of Le Quesnoy in northern France had been under German occupation since August 1914 and this was November 1918. Surrounded by a moat and a 17th century wall complete with ramparts, the medieval town was like a fortress that had survived many an invasion in the preceding centuries. It had one more force to reckon with. The New Zealand Division had arrived to liberate the town from the German occupiers, who continued to defend the ramparts using howitzers, machine guns and rifles. Orders had been given to the New Zealand troops not to shell the town, to avoid any casualties among the 1600 civilian inhabitants.

Instead, some 300 flaming oil drums were fired onto the ramparts to create a smoke screen obscuring the assault by New Zealand infantry using long ladders to scale the outer walls and inner ramparts. The liberation of the town was completed with the capture of over 700 German soldiers, against just on 500 New Zealand casualties including 142 dead - the liberation was achieved without

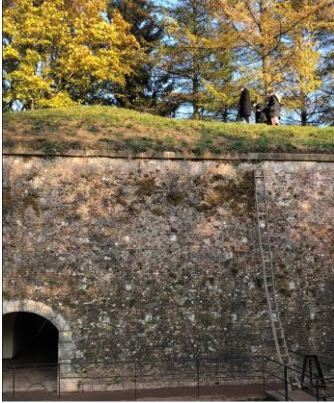

the loss of a single civilian life. This is an achievement which the town and its people have never forgotten, even today - over 100 years later - which is now beyond living memory. They speak of the liberation with awe, still amazed that men would come from the far side of the world to free their town and citizens, to rescue them in their darkest hour.

The liberation of the historic walled town by the New Zealand Rifle Brigade just one week before the end of the Great War was a demonstration of Kiwi ingenuity and an act of courage. The story of Le Quesnoy is different from that of many other World War One sites – the town was liberated without being destroyed, and the residents were not displaced, and in that respect, it is a story of hope. The town was preserved intact and stands as a place where memories are lived and relived to tell the story to all who will listen; of the price that was paid for freedom in a war that stole much from our world.

The Project

The NZ Memorial Museum Trust - Le Quesnoy (a non-profit charitable trust) believes it is time to build a permanent memorial to our soldiers who perished on the fields of Flanders and France in the “war to end all wars”. Indeed, it did not end all wars and many more New Zealanders lost their lives on European soil in the Second World War. Over 12,400 New Zealanders are buried in France and Belgium. It is appropriate that the sacrifice of a significant number of New Zealanders, who will remain forever in a place far from home, is acknowledged and remembered.



The Trust has had the opportunity to purchase a heritage property, the former Mayor's residence and Gendarmerie (military police headquarters), in Le Quesnoy, which is directly connected to New Zealand's World War One experience in Europe.

The Trust is working towards the vision of creating “a Kiwi place in France where memory and relationships are alive”. We are working towards this goal through the establishment of a Museum and Visitor Centre in Le Quesnoy where our story will be told across multiple platforms – through artefacts, interactive activities, movies, audio stations, an app and other media.

The museum itself will include space for exhibitions and interactive activities, both digital and manual, designed to encounter and explore the stories of New Zealand's liberation of Le Quesnoy, New Zealand's contributions to the war in Europe, the history of the town of Le Quesnoy, an introduction to New Zealand's culture and heritage to Europeans, and the unique relationship that has developed between New Zealand and the French in Le Quesnoy.

Our Objective

Friendship – the unique bonds which developed between the people of Le Quesnoy and New Zealand which are still strong 100 years on

Future – the opportunity to create a better future with a focus on how to avoid war

Our Partners

To fully realise the link between past, present and future, we have engaged New Zealand's most respected professional museum experts to help shape and guide the concept through strategic planning and interpretative masterplanning. We have recently approved the Internal Experience Design Brief for the Museum and Visitor Centre prepared by museum experts Lily Frederikse, Tim Walker and Karl Johnstone. The Feasibility Study prepared by French company, Lamaya, was signed off last year and our Māori Advisory Group has provided a Māori cultural framework to inform the overall visitor experience.

We are in discussions with the French government about a potential partnership. They are very supportive of the project.

We have raised \$8M to date towards the \$15M total. Most of this has come from private individuals and businesses, who are on board with the vision of establishing "a Kiwi place in France where memory and relationships are alive". This is not just a project about remembering the past but focuses on the future, developing an experience which is cross-cultural, connecting across nations, through educational experiences and exchanges, offering an opportunity to reflect and learn from the past as we step into the future. As it is so beautifully expressed in Te Reo:

Ka mua, ka muri

We walk backwards into the future.

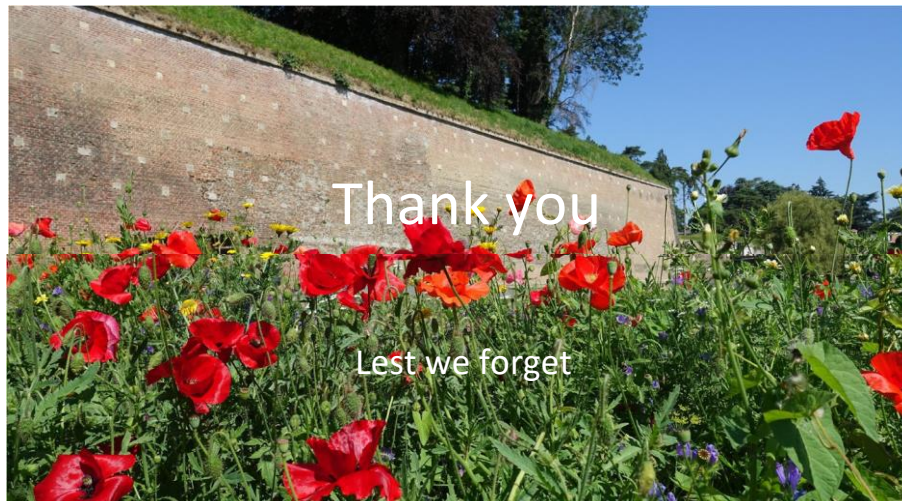
In this day and time, we cannot even imagination what they must have faced on the battle grounds of Europe, but we can remember and honour them.

Dear Mayor and Councilors

Thank you for the opportunity to submit on the TDC Long Term Plan.

1. [Project Tongariro](#) is an umbrella Trust that has been active in both Ruapehu and Taupō districts for over 35 years.

We utilise our entity to collaborate with a wide representation of the community who want to make a difference to our environment.

Two key highly successful projects we have had a long history managing are the biodiversity restoration at Mt Pihanga - Lake Rotopounamu in Tongariro National Park and secondly in association with hapu, Maori land owners and DOC - restoration of the Te Matapuna (south Lake Taupō) wetlands.

More recently we have initiated and administered the formation and management of [Greening Taupō](#), [Kids Greening Taupō](#) and [Predator Free Taupō](#). We are also working with the community to restore environmental values at Oruatua, Tauranga-Taupō River and the Tongariro River adjacent to Kutai Street.

2. We endorse and encourage the Council's Vision of protecting Taupō's world class natural environment" and making Taupō a great place to live. Greening Taupō, Kids Greening Taupō and Predator Free Taupō are each focused towards achieving these goals.
3. The current TDC Long-Term Plan (apart from its Vision) and the 2021 Discussion Paper do not illustrate any specific planned actions to enhance the environmental values of Taupō. There is a financial commitment along with Waikato Regional Council and Iwi to protect the water quality of Lake Taupō but no structured planned programme of indigenous plantings to replace exotic forests felled by Council or enhancement of storm water gullies or Council Reserves. We also note the lack of landscape planting on the Taupō ETA. We acknowledge the ETA is a Central Government responsibility but its construction was a joint project with Council. Compare this to similar projects throughout the country and it's a sad comparison!

4. We strongly support the Taupō District Council Revegetation Plan and Planting Guide. We note it does list priority planting sites and we suggest these sites should be scheduled for restoration planting over the term of the Long-Term Plan. That would significantly mitigate our concerns expressed in 3 above.

At present there is 'ad hoc' restoration at some of these sites. We are committed to supporting Council efforts but urge a more prioritised, committed approach to enhance the values of our community.

5. The Greening Taupō Service Agreement with TDC has been very significant in growing Greening Taupō and ensuring the community is contributing to and valuing the natural environment of Taupō. Through it being community led the work is 'owned' by the community and its care supported by the community. We are proud of what the community has achieved!

We do note with some concern the apparent under resourcing of the Parks and Reserves team in the last year which has resulted in less assistance being available to assist the community restoration efforts.

6. We believe we can continue to grow these values through Greening Taupō and Kids Greening Taupō (the community of the future). We have a successful record of obtaining funds to purchase trees for sites like Whakaipo Bay, Wairakei Corridor and the Waikato River. These are all long-term sustainable projects. We have recently committed to a significant long-term restoration planting programme at the Taupō Golf Course which will benefit the community and wildlife.

We rely on Council to assist funding our employment of a Greening Taupō Coordinator who is vital to the community involvement. There are also considerable costs associated with advertising, promotion, equipment and community barbeques.

We note the role our Greening Taupō and Kids Greening Taupō teams (and our supporters) also make towards ensuring successful planting and often maintenance at Council sites (Spa Park, Hipapatua) as well as for

Taupō District Council have been a member of our Kids Greening Taupō Strategic Leadership Team since inception of the programme and this is much appreciated. We note we have not sought direct financial assistance since Year 1 to assist this programme which we believe is of great long-term benefit to the community. In future years and once past the impacts of Covid-19 we would like Council to consider a contribution to the programme.

7. We highlight the negative impact of feral cats and semi domestic cats in the district. We acknowledge the difficulty but urge Council to consider the introduction of measures to licence domestic cats so they can be controlled and feral cats managed. Australian cities are handling this well and cities in NZ are now considering appropriate measures. We think Taupō District Council must accept the challenge.
8. As stated in 4 above we strongly support Council's Revegetation Plan and Planting Guide. But sadly, we note that new Subdivision plantings such as Whakarewa often include plant pests like weeping cherry. We urge subdivision planting plan approval being in accord with your policy and action being taken by staff to ensure pest plants are removed. There also needs to be a focused public awareness campaign as to suitable plants for planting in gardens.

NB; We would like to be heard in support of our submission.

I don't believe the rhetoric stating that it would stop people from visiting Turangi town and actually believe the opposite may well be true.

- people turn off to the "hot pools", to buy pass cars that are about to slow down as the "tokaanu 80km" is coming up... they then hoon through the entire road to re-join the highway, off Matariki street - that is not included in the 80Km stretch as the Tokaanu Boards does not reflect the area of Tokaanu
- There has been a record of someone doing 155.7KM on Matariki street (average around 60-90)- I don't even know how they managed to stop early enough to re-join the highway or if they just flagged the sign all together. This is unacceptable - there is children, pedestrians and fur babies on this road! (we lost one of our babies, to someone speeding, only a month after we moved in here - that could have been someone's child!)
- our street needs speed bumps please - and reduce the speed from 50-40.... enforce speed cameras - you will make lots of money on infringements!
- there is no marking on the road, it is not even 2 cars wide
- people treat it like a one way, which ever direction they are going

1 Executive summary

Sport and active recreation is a challenged sector relying on volunteers, community funding, resources from support agencies, local authorities for facilities. These challenges, layered with the fallout from Covid-19 and Sport Waikato completing an organisational transformation, has created a critical point in time for Taupō District Council to take stock and consider its involvement and ongoing contribution to the sector.

This report considers the leadership and delivery of support services to sport and active recreation provision across the district. It looks into the recent past activity and investment by the key stakeholders, considers what the future influences might be in terms of national initiatives, and proposes three actions for Council to consider:

1. Continue the current district support roles
2. Review/reframe the Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy
3. Engage with Sport Waikato for the future of sport and active recreation across the Taupō District

These will require an increase or reassignment of investment in the short-term, a likely increased commitment of time by Council staff and when appropriate Councillors, and a proactive approach to working with Sport Waikato and Lake Taupō District Sports Advisory Council.

2 Introduction

Sport and physical activity across the Taupō District has been lead, facilitated and delivered by a combination of entities from informal volunteer groups, to clubs, to sport event specialists, to Taupō District Council (TDC), to Sport Waikato (SW), to Lake Taupō District Sports Advisory Council (LTDSAC) and a range of others. Collectively the results on physical activity rates since 2007 have been virtually static as demonstrated by Sport NZ's Active NZ Survey.

SW is the Regional Sport Trust (RST) with responsibility for the Taupō District within the scope of their deliverable outcomes. In the second half of 2020 SW embarked on an organisational transformation to seek a better way to influence positive change in physical activity levels and health outcomes for the region. This change is to direct the primary resources of time and expertise to improve the system of physical activity by increasing capability and efficiency. To achieve this, resources will no longer be applied to hands-on frontline delivery.

SW's refocus of resources to a strategic, collaborative (partnered), regional approach and retracting from front-end delivery has created a level of uncertainty about the future delivery of physical activity for Taupō District Council. This report examines the:

- The resourcing needs for delivery of physical activity across the district
- Type of resource required
- The current and potential sources of resource
- If/where there are shortfalls, and
- Recommends options to support any identified shortfalls

This report was commissioned by TDC to provide context and recommendations in support of the Long-Term Plan submission process.

2.1 Context

With SW's withdrawal from delivery activity there is a perception that there will be a void in sport and active recreation delivery which will need to be filled through other mechanisms. A likely key stakeholder to support the filling the perceived void will be TDC. Exactly what that might look like needs to be explored and this report begins that process.

2.2 Purpose

This report considers the delivery of sport and active recreation in terms of the situation prior to SW's redirection transition and the contributing stakeholders. It then looks forward to what the potential gaps will be and how these might be addressed.

While it is the catalyst for this review the delivery sport and active recreation needs to be considered in a more holistic perspective ie SW is not the source of all sport and active recreation but the do play a centralised support role across sport and active recreation.

The intended outcome is an assessment of the potential sports and active recreation delivery gaps and a set of recommended approaches to continue the ongoing delivery.

2.3 Assumptions and limitations

For the purpose of the report the following assumptions have been made:

- TDC is motivated to maintain delivery levels of sport and active recreation across the district
- Sport Waikato and TDC will continue to work alongside each other into the future
- The funding model for sport and active recreation across the district for the purposes of this report will be limited to the funding investment into the district through the TDC, SW and the LTDSAC
- The impacts of Covid-19 and the resulting lockdown levels are an influence on what 2020 looks like ie it was not a normal year. Therefore, the best indication of what normal current state looks like is 2019 or the latest data available excluding 2020.
- The capital investment for sport and recreation facilities is excluded from this report
- The focus is on community level sport and recreation delivery and excludes high performance and major events
- Funding provided through philanthropic trusts to wider sport and active recreation organisations is excluded from this report

The limitations of this report are:

- The report is limited to desktop research, key stakeholder consultation, and information analysis.
- No wider stakeholder consultation was commissioned
- No public consultation was commissioned

2.4 Stakeholders

As noted earlier there are three key stakeholders this report considers in the delivery of support services to the sport and active recreation sector.

2.4.1 Taupō District Council

TDC is the territorial local authority for the 37,125² residents of the district. It is the southernmost district within the Waikato region. It has three urban centres, Mangakino Taupō, and Turangi. Taupo is the largest with a population of 25,400, with Turangi having 3,650, and Mangakino with 1,257.

TDC provide a variety of sports and recreation facilities as identified in the Taupō District Council Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy 2020. TDC also supports sports and recreation by way of grant funding through contestable application processes.

2.4.2 Lake Taupō District Sports Advisory Council

LTDSAC is an organisation whose function is the development and fostering of sport in the Taupo District³.

In conjunction with SW, LTDSAC established Taupō Sport Services a sporting administration opening in September 2010. Taupō Sport Services supports local sports groups/clubs and their volunteers by offering free services to assist with all facets of sport administration across the Taupō district.

Some of the services they offer are:

- Typing – minutes, letters, team lists
- Photocopying
- Email communication
- Database setup
- Seasonal assistance – registrations, draws, results etc
- Newsletters /Flyers/Pamphlets/Business Cards
- Funding advice
- Club structures and processes/Constitutions
- Sporty website assistance
- Tournament/competition assistance

The LTDSAC has been the partnered distributing agency of the TDC - Community Sports Grant under contract to TDC. TDC allocates funding each year to support sporting activities and approved projects in the Taupo district.

2.4.3 Sport Waikato

One of 17 RSTs around the country, SW was one of the first established. Covering the area from Coromandel to Turangi and Waihi to Kawhia. SW is a Charitable Trust funded through regional contracts, sponsorship, fundraising and donations.

SW's aim is to increase the physical activity levels of people in the region by making play, active recreation and sport more accessible, exciting, relevant and inclusive. They will do this by supporting those who influence play, active recreation and sport in the region - those who run it, administer it, organise it, invest in it and coach it.

SW provide high value, strategic, regional leadership in play, active recreation and sport through collaboration and partnership. Their goal is to have 75% of the Waikato region active by 2030⁴.

Through 2020 SW had already embarked on an effort to focus on influencing the system by prioritising the more strategic and leadership focused activities over every day, hands on delivery. The primary change for the Taupō district has been the disestablishment of the District Sports Coordinator position and the introduction of a Regional Connectivity Coordinator. The fundamental differences between the roles:

District Sports Coordinator (1FTE for the Taupō District) the principal connector being to the participant and local sector. Primarily a delivery and advocacy role. Role was very reactive, was often everything to everyone – including event marshal, volunteer etc.

Regional Connectivity Coordinator (1FTE for the Taupō and South Waikato districts) has close connect with Council staff (e.g. technical managers) and is an influencer rather than a deliverer. This means influencing decision making about the investment and provision of play, active recreation and sport with Council personnel. Proactively working to partnered strategy and using insights to guide work programme. Also having a key role in providing local sector support to ensure sustainability and relevance of opportunities for physical activity in the community (eg a focus on participation and development opportunities, increasing collaboration across the sector, and encouraging innovation – e.g. new and modified formats of activity that better meet participant needs).

2.4.4 Wider sport and active recreation organisations

Across the whole sport and active recreation sector there are a range of stakeholder groups. Without attempting to list them all a sample of those involved include:

- Clubs
- Associations
- Regionals Sports Organisations
- Primary, intermediate and secondary schools
- Event organisers
- Turangi Tongariro Sports Foundation - a volunteer organisation supporting sports clubs and sports people in and around Turangi. They run the Annual Turangi Sports Awards, the Annual Junior Triathlon, and run a Watersport Programme⁵.

3 Current state assessment

To develop a context of what is currently happening in the sport and active recreation field across the district a snapshot of information has been collated. This data has had to come from a variety of sources and is not a complete picture of sport leadership and delivery, but it does provide good indicators.

3.1 Data set by specific grouping

Actual registered numbers from all sport and recreation activities are extremely difficult to secure. The data researched for this report has been sourced from the Sport New Zealand (Sport NZ) Insights Tool. The Insights Tool sources data from:

- Statistics NZ
- Active NZ survey (Sport NZ)
- School Sport New Zealand sports participation data
- Ministry of Education
- Ministry of Health
- Nielsen Research.

Sport New Zealand conduct regular research study projects with some being longitudinal. The data they collect is then shared through publications and direct commissions from sector partners. SW is one of these partners with mandate for the Taupō District. SW have commissioned deeper research data sets and did so in 2018. This information is then collated into publications for public distribution.

3.1.1 Sport and active recreation participation profile adults 18+

The research information through Sport NZ's Insight Tool has been collated by SW and Table 2 identifies some of the key information. Taupō District has a total population of 37,125 of this 27,547⁶ are 18 or over.

3.1.2 Young people sport and active recreation activity

In the same way as the information for adults 18+, the data has been collated and Table 3 identifies some of the key information. Taupō District has a total population of 37,125 of this 9,615¹⁰ are 5 to 17 years old.

3.1.3 Primary and intermediate schools' sports activity

In 2020 there were 20 primary and intermediate state and state-integrated schools with a total roll of 4,277 across the district¹⁴.

Primary and intermediate school children engage in sport both in and out of school. As noted earlier the data behind actual participation is from survey responses rather than actual registered sports participant records. One data set we can analyse is the participation numbers of the Kiwisport programme delivered in the district.

Kiwisport is a Government funding initiative to support sport for school-aged children¹⁵. Kiwisport provides funding for schools for year 1-8 students and year 9-13 students via the Ministry of Education and community projects (via Sport NZ to regional sports trusts) to achieve the following aims:

- To increase the number of school-aged children participating in organised sport
- Increase the availability and accessibility of sport opportunities for all school-aged children.
- Support children in developing skills that will enable them to participate effectively in sport.

In the Taupo District the engagement of schools in the Kiwisport delivery programme has grown from seven schools in 2011 to 14 schools in 2021. Some schools align themselves across district boundaries in school clusters so do not engage with the Taupō District KiwiSport Programme.

The Kiwisport programme schools:

- ADDI School
- Hilltop School
- Kuratau School
- Lake Taupo Christian School
- Marotiri School
- Mountainview School
- Tauhara School
- Taupo School
- Te Kura o Waitahanui
- Tirohanga School
- St Patricks Catholic School
- Waipahihi School
- Wairakei School
- Whakamaru School

In 2019 there were 11,793 Kiwisport activity participants - where a participant is an individual involved in a programme delivered for a sport ie a child can be involved with multiple sports delivered in a year. In 2020 there were 13,067 participants, even with the period of lockdown and resulting multiple cancellations¹⁶.

The primary and intermediate schools' sports activity data in the Sport NZ lead surveys for under 18-year-old so this is captured under Young people sport and active recreation activity.

3.1.4 Secondary Schools Sports Activity

As with primary and intermediate school children, secondary school students engage in sport both in and out of school. There is a higher emphasis on school representation and less delivered for this age group through club administered sport.

There are two secondary schools in the Taupo District, and they are both located in Taupo itself. The total roll of secondary school students in 2020 was 1685 (this has decreased over the last three years, in 2018 there were 1764 students). Both schools employ sports coordinators to facilitate school sports activities outside the physical education curriculum for a total of 1.5 full time equivalent employees.

For inter-school sporting activity the Taupō schools align to the Sport Bay of Plenty region. School Sport New Zealand conduct the National Secondary School Sport Census which is targeted to secondary schools.

The overview of participation, and teacher/staff contributions to sport delivery in the secondary school environment over the last five years is captured in Table 4.

Staff numbers have reduced within the schools, but this is not reflected in the number of staff involved in sport.

3.2 Funding landscape

To support sport and active recreation across the district there is investment from the stakeholders this report has focused on. The primary source of the funding is through TDC and this is complimented by leveraging resources through SW and LTDSAC.

3.2.1 Taupō District Council

On a three-year cycle TDC commits financial resources through a contestable grants process for partnership agreements (see Table 6). The next three-year cycle begins from July 2021.

As noted in the Assumptions section, events are excluded from the report but alongside the above commitments TDC also contributed \$316,000 to sport and active recreation events across the district in 2019/20.

3.2.2 Sport Waikato

SW are themselves not a funding source but rather the distributor of funds through central government funding initiatives. The sole funding initiative until 2020 was KiwiSport. This fund was distributed in either a Community Partnership Fund Grant (Maximum 40k per applicant) or a Faststart Grant (new projects only max \$15k).

In 2020 KiwiSport was replaced by Tu Manawa and as a response to the Covid-19 impacts on the sector Sport NZ provided funding support through the Community Resilience Fund.

Both KiwiSport and Tu Manawa are awarded by a grants panel and are decided on the merit of applications based on criteria set by Sport NZ, therefore funding being awarded or quantum's received are not guaranteed year to year. Both are competitive funding pools and are generally well oversubscribed. The Community Resilience Fund was based on proven financial loss as a result of the pandemic.

SW contributes to sport and active recreation across the district primarily through facilitating funding distribution and providing people resources based on funded roles.

3.2.3 Lake Taupō District Sports Advisory Council

The LTDSAC secure funds through a range of grants and initiatives to leverage the resources for delivery of sport and active recreational activity. Grants received are from TDC to support the support services function LTDSAC provides.

The contribution LTDSAC provides to sport and active recreation across the district is a mix of direct funding distribution and people resources/capability.

5 The 'hard' issues

Sport and active recreation sector continues to battle the forces of ever increasing user expectations, increasing costs, growing pressure on funding sources, reducing volunteerism etc. and this is going to continue. Sport NZ are leading a reframing and reshaping movement for the sector to evolve towards the future. Some of the key principles are optimising resources such as shared services models, consolidated investment in facilities for multi-sport use, reducing the reliance on grant sources etc.

5.1 Change has to happen

SW refocusing their resources onto strategic influencing and away from front line delivery has provided TDC the opportunity to stop and review how the Council is using its resources in this space and determine if change is required.

It is no secret that sport and active recreation has been in a delicate state for years. The clubs and organisations that have been able to develop into robust organisations with documented policies and procedures, that have an active approach to good governance, and a scale in membership, are the ones that will have the best chance to successfully operate into the future. In reality clubs are at the mercy of having passionate volunteers that do "the right thing" for the club and its members. As these people come and go the success (or not) of the club fluctuates. It is a fragile model.

Sport NZ are progressing through their three phases of change in response to Covid-19:

- Reset and rebuild
- Strengthen and adapt
- Different and better

TDC must stay abreast of the national movement of change and where possible contribute to it.

5.2 Time, resource and expertise is required

TDC will not be able to address the longer-term needs of the district's sport and active recreation needs by just addressing the urgent gaps identified through the SW changes. A strategic approach is required, and this will take time and collaboration with the wider sector.

The urgent gaps are:

- the coordination and delivery of the KiwiSport programme - due to the funding model change; and
- the delivery elements of the District Sport Coordinator role that will not be part of the Regional Connectivity Coordinator position.

6 The 'soft' issues

The role TDC plays by supporting organisations such as SW and LTDSAC is an important one.

6.1 Data and measures

To determine the actual return on investment of sport and active recreation contributions a specific set of objective data needs to be secured to support survey information available through Sport NZ. Not having robust data makes measuring outcomes difficult and directing investment effectively very challenging.

6.2 Do nothing

An approach could be to do nothing and see what happens. This will put LTDSAC in a challenging position to decide on continuing to support the roles through securing their own funding, scaling them back, or ending them all together.

It is likely school curricular sport and active recreation will continue with limited impact in the short term but in the longer term the decreased exposure to sport and active recreation will see reductions in participation and the resulting effects of less active young people.

7 Opportunities

While this report has been commissioned out of urgency there are some strategic opportunities to be considered. There is no single, one-size-fits-all solution to continue the drive towards a healthy, active, functioning community.

7.1 Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy

TDC have a Taupō District Council Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy 2020 (the Strategy) prepared and ready for approval. There has been investment to produce this document and it has some sound actions identified relating to facilities as TDC is the primary provider of these. It also speaks to some of the wider influences on the sector such as shared services and developing hubs.

This is a key work stream for SW and LTDSAC are also involved on the periphery. There is an opportunity to cast a more holistic lens over the strategy in a collaborative approach to determine if any change is required before the strategy is adopted. The context of leadership and delivery may need to be emphasised more and the theme of facilities softened.

The issues TDC face identified in the Strategy are listed in Table 9.

While many of these are directly facility related many are not and a wider approach could be taken to demonstrate the commitment to sport and active recreation as more than focusing on bricks and mortar.

The Key Actions within the Strategy reflect a wider approach also. Some of these include:

Establish a Community Recreation Liaison position responsible for:

- Community and corporate partnerships
- Direct liaison with open space facility users (clubs etc.)
- Alternative funding sources
- Technical working groups
- Parks and Recreation communications

Promote recreational and programme water space at swimming facilities in preference to additional competitive and lap water space

Investigate potential for accommodating a national hub for either volleyball or gym sports

Develop hubs where all needs for training, competition and administration are met for compatible organisations. Four potential sports hubs are identified:

7.2 Consolidate the “new normal” with Sport Waikato

Walk with Sport Waikato through the process. Engage together on the Strategy and the subsequent Key Actions. By doing this TDC and SW will settle into the evolved roles and responsibilities.

SW will play a role in how TDC can be future focused for sport and active recreation. If the findings from the Sport NZ Futures Programme are to be considered (Table 10) SW will be able to support TDC with direction here.

Table 10 - Key insights for change²¹

Mana Ōrite

The Sector must deliver on the Treaty Partnership to ensure Māori are engaged in all decision making across the sector to ensure the integrity of the partnership.

Mana Taurite

There is equitable access to resource to ensure this reaches those currently excluded from the mainstream allocation. This will be challenging as it requires leadership courage from those who may need to relinquish power.

Overhaul governance

Current national sports and recreational organisations are based on structures designed for 2 to 3 generations ago. A complete reset is required if the current low levels of trust are to be lifted.

Devolve decisions

Related to the points above is the need to move decision-making closer to those it affects. To achieve this effectively will require significant investment in distributed leadership and capacity building.

Adopt the perspective that physical activity is a human right

The sector should aim to achieve the same understanding of its criticality as the health sector enjoys today. In a future world of uncertainty, wellbeing will be a key factor of resilience.

Develop a 'Wellbeing Agency'

Develop a 'Wellbeing Agency' to provide leadership, co-ordination and insight across sectors in achieving the wellbeing agenda and overcome current fragmented practice.

Recognize that physical wellbeing as a fundamental component to daily life

Recognize that physical wellbeing as a fundamental component to daily life to ensure more holistic approaches are adopted across related sectors (e.g. transport policy; urban and rural planning, food policy, education).

Understand, and overcome, barriers

Access to space, limitations of finance and ability, pressures from a changing working world are conspiring to reduce physical activity for key sectors. The dynamic of this change is not well understood though, and research is required to ensure better targeting of resources.

7.3 Maintain delivery support

In the meantime, the key roles of KiwiSport Officer, District Sports Coordinator delivery functions, and Taupō Sport Services provide a service for the schools, clubs and community organizations across the district. Connecting clubs and expertise into schools, supporting clubs with administrative services and guidance, and facilitating sport and active recreation enhancement activity that is difficult to quantify but would be missed if it no longer existed.

8 Recommendations

There are some short-term actions to allow the current delivery to be maintained while there is a transition of focus and responsibilities for the key stakeholders.

8.1 Continue the current district support roles

The support roles of KiwiSport Officer, and Taupō Sport Services should be continued and funded for the next 12-18 months while recommendations 2 and 3 are worked through. While the new SW Regional Connectivity Coordinator position settles into their work stream across two districts, the District Support Coordinator (or the Strategy proposed Community Recreation Liaison) is retained/supported to some level ensuring the frontline delivery aspects are not neglected.

To do this TDC will need to consider:

for the KiwiSport Officer role (12 months)	\$24,000
for sport administration support (12 months)	\$27,000
for a District Sport Coordinator / Community Recreation Liaison (12 months)	\$20,000 - \$30,000
TOTAL (12 months)	\$71,000 - \$81,000

8.2 Review/reframe the Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy

With a lens of the changing sector landscape and TDC's role within this. Consider if the draft Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy 2020 can accommodate the wider issues being highlighted as a result of Covid-19 and SW organization transformation. In a collaborative process with SW and LTDSAC over the next six months.

8.3 Engage with Sport Waikato for the future of sport and active recreation across the Taupō District

Set out a schedule of collaborative engagement opportunities that contribute to the reviewed/reframed Sports and Recreation Facilities Strategy. The engagements should be meaningful, equitable in terms of opportunity to contribute, and have the right personnel involved ie operational staff, management and governance where appropriate.

This can begin prior to the review/reframe process and will continue into the future in alignment with the strategy. Defining a set of key success measures will help to monitor the effectiveness of the engagement.

Water

While I largely support an equal water rate for all ratepayers, I note that a Taupo ratepayer will only pay about \$30 more, but turangi and omori/pukawa ratepayers will have a much larger rate increase, which may be difficult for lower income ratepayers.

The waihaha and tirohanga schemes are small, and very expensive. Is there any opportunity to fund moving these properties to individual rain tank or bore water (as for most rural properties) and then shutting down these schemes?

Transport

The NZ government has committed to reaching net zero emissions of CO2 by 2050. 30 years is quite a short time to achieve this, so we need to start planning and changing our transport systems now.

Behavior change will play a huge role in reducing transport emissions. I applaud the council plans for a more pedestrian friendly town centre. However Council also needs prioritise cycling and public transport (in partnership with WRC).

One of the biggest roadblocks to people cycling is feeling unsafe on the road. Making cycling

safer by separating cyclists from cars should be a priority for council, and cycle ways should be required in all new subdivisions.

Providing "15 minute neighborhoods" is also vital to plan for reducing our transport emissions. If we could all access the services we need such as schools and grocery stores within a 15 minute walk there would be less need to get behind the wheel. Council needs to plan for more commercial zoning for shopping areas in our suburbs, and in villages like Kinloch.

Parks, Reserves & Sports Grounds

I recently visited a semi-rural park in Palmerston north, with a natural play area with large logs, rocks and tires. Something like this in Taupo would be great.

I also fully support further native plantings in our parks and reserves, and orchard plantings such as in Laughton reserve.

Libraries & Museum

While I don't support building a new museum, I do support renovating and extending the current museum if funding becomes available. There is adequate space for an extension in the old bowling green behind the museum.

Public Toilets & Cemeteries

I would like to see the superloo be made free, and perhaps installing coin operation for the showers. Particularly as we will likely have more people in the area when the playground and lake terrace upgrades are completed.

I also applaud councils plans to allow for natural burials in the future. This would be my preference when my time is up.

Wastewater

I support any measures which will decrease the threat of wastewater spills into lake Taupo. Personally I would like to see a bylaw banning the sale of "flushable" wipes in our district. I also believe that insinkerators increase the risk of sewage blockages, as people put fatty substances down them. Council could consider not allowing these in any new builds, and funding composting systems instead.

Solid Waste

I would like council to investigate the "twin your bin" movement that has been adopted in some locations in Canada. In this system residents put their bins together in groups for collection every few houses, or put their bins on the same side of the street. This reduces the number of stops a rubbish truck has to make, saving time and potentially emissions (in the single side of the street scheme, as the trucks only have to drive down each street once). It is also safer when rubbish trucks make fewer stops, reducing the risk of accidents involving trucks and other road users.

Stormwater

I would like some recognition that when urban residents put fertilizer on their lawn it can end up in our lake through the stormwater, particularly when excessive amounts are used.

Building Consents, Resource Consents, Dogs, Noise, Liquor, Environmental Health

I would like to see cats also regulated, not just dogs. Cats should be microchipped, desexed, and a limit on number of cats per household imposed. I submitted on this in the bylaw review.
